MATH

This week we continued working in Chapter 3: *Whole Number* Multiplication & Division. We understand that the word problems in this chapter have been very challenging. Please know that your child is not alone in feeling this way. We discussed with students that these multi-step problems are a process and we are not expecting mastery at this point. We want them to put forth effort in breaking the problem down into steps and getting as far as they can. A good handful of students require our step-by-step guidance and support for these challenging problems. For this reason, we gave the math chapter "review" as the test and the usual "test" as the review. We want students to feel more successful after this long and involved chapter. The more challenging word problems that we assigned for homework are actually harder than the test questions. This time around, we want to score students on concepts that are closer to their reach.

As a reminder, you can download and print extra practice or reteach pages for each chapter from our website.

Please remind your child to practice their multiplication facts for a minimum of three minutes per night in order to alleviate frustration in class due to the fact that they don't have a handle on their times tables. It can slow students down on their long division when they are looking for factors of a number. Thank you for your support at home!
